I was able to qualify and compete at Junior Hunter Finals (Michigan), NHS Finals (Kentucky), and USHJA Hunter Seat Medal Finals (Massachusetts). In addition to competing at these events, I received the Leo Conroy Equitation Grant at NHS finals for my sportsmanship and horsemanship skills. Qualifying for these events and receiving this prestigious—grant would have not been possible without the love and support of my mother, my devoted trainer who made all of my dreams come true through her endless devotion to cultivating me into a dynamic rider, and lastly my horse who has proved to be such a willing partner through every step of our journey together.

I completed my junior year with the honor of accepting the Chub Memorial Trophy which commemorated my horsemanship and sportsmanship skills over the course of the year. Additionally, I was champion of the Junior Hunter division and champion of the Junior Equitation 15-17 division.
